

Route 66 Dinor: Customers, Family, Vendors, & Nutcases

On Sunday December 9th, the Route 66 Dinor closed. Personal and health issues led to this decision. Only Jerry and Lib Adams owned the Dinor longer (31 vs. 15 years) since it opened June 1939, as the F&F Dinor. Route 66 Dinor in 12 years of business hired 56 people (27 kids 14 to 18 years old) from Marienville area. Route 66 Dinor paid ½ million dollars wages, ¼ million dollars taxes, and ⅛ million dollars utilities. 6000 corporate checks were written. We cracked over a ½ million eggs, and served 25 tons of homefries and breakfast meats each. It took a lot of very good customers to eat this much food, including ones with extra personality. We even had all aged waitresses with extra personality. Dinor's most fun was the belly laughing scenarios, watching people establish friendships, and helping kids grow up. 2012 was a good year. On only 4 days per week it beat sales of any of the 1st 4 years (2001-2004), even with the 2nd & 3rd years running 7 days per week. 2012 had a record March, record Trout Season opening weekend, and record July 4th weekend. Dinor needs an energetic family with tax advantages that can also pocket tips. Dinor was with realtors for 2.5 years. Internet will be used to find a new Dinor family. On Sunday December 9th, we are planning an "Eat Whats Left" good time day (special waitresses, menu, times). Profits from the day will be donated to Leukemia Society.
